A very enthusiastic group of people from a church in Heerjansdam (Netherlands) gave up their holiday to help finish the rooms at this new building. Among many other things, they painted, sew curtains and made sensory toys. For two weeks they rolled up their sleeves to make a difference and also to give the children a wonderful time. They also took the Rainbow Angels on a camp. It was a wonderful time for the children!



## Recycle art



On all our schools a lot of attention is given to recycling. Because this is still a quite unknown concept in this area, the parents also receive some training in this. As a result of this the staff from Noah's Ark Playschool organized an afternoon for the parents. They were to make a craft from recycled materials. This was such a wonderful afternoon! They had a lot of fun and bonded really well. Afterwards they displayed their pieces of art for the other parents and staff. Activities like these also teach the parents that it's very easy to do this at home with their children and that it doesn't have to cost and arm and a leg.

Another recycle 'challenge' was organized at Rainbow School. There they had a Trashy-Fashion show with real judges and prizes. The children and parents, who helped with making the clothes, were very proud of their handiwork.

Next to being taught lots of very important skills that will hopefully give them the possibility to find a job in the near future, they learn that God loves them very much and has a plan and a future for them. Derk and Hanka help them discover their personal relationship with Him. This is very important for them because in their neighbourhood they are often seen as unimportant and scum. It's often very difficult for them to grasp that Jesus loves them.

### Students from Harvard


